Alex Burghart MP, Minister for Skills at the Department for Education

Alex is a Conservative politician who has been the MP for Brentwood and Ongar since June 2017. In September 2021, he was appointed as the Minister for Skills at the Department for Education.

Since becoming an MP, Alex has served on the DWP select committee and on the Joint Committee on Human Rights, and between 2019 and 2021 as Parliamentary Private Secretary to the Prime Minister.

Alex worked in higher education for 6 years and is the son of two teachers. The first person in his family to go to university, he read history at Oxford before taking his doctorate at King's College London where he taught and lectured.

He has worked previously on the Munro Review of Child Protection, and as Director of Policy at the Centre for Social Justice. Between 2016 and 2017, Alex served as a Special Adviser to the then Prime Minister on social justice.
